Here are some suggestions for work you can put in throughout the semester: visit the campus Learning Center for free tutoring, ask when you have questions on the material, arrive on time and do not leave early, turn in your assignments completed, spend a minimum of six hours outside of class time working on the coursework, do not skip any assignments, take detailed notes that will make sense to you when you study, make flash cards to help you remember tough topics and go over them often, do not skip class, use the help of your peers during group work.
