Course Description: Introductory study of the principles of routine husbandry of livestock production in agriculture. Topics will include selection, management practices, nutrition, animal anatomy, reproductive physiology, facilities management, and socio-ethical issues. Three hours of lecture are integrated with two hours of lab activities each week. Lab fee.

Textbook: Field and Taylor, *Scientific Farm Animal Production – An Introduction to Animal Science*

Class Format: The course will use a combination of lectures, discussion, tours and activities with an emphasis on discussion and activities. Students will be responsible for assigned readings and for the lecture/discussion/activity materials. Responsibility for missed classes resides with the students.

Papers: There will be 8 papers assigned following farm visits or tours, classroom videos. The paper needs to be at least one page in length (no more than 1.5 spacing) and cover topics that you found interesting from the visit. Make sure to include at least one thing that you learned that you did not know previously. Papers will be graded based on substance and grammar.

Presentations:

1.) Individual presentations assigned during the second week of class. Individuals will choose a species/type of animal from the following list: (Beef, Dairy, Poultry-Chickens/Turkeys, Goats & Sheep, and Equine). On your assigned presentation day, you will provide the class with a 45 minute presentation on your animal, feel free to include helpful videos. This PowerPoint presentation should include common breeds, uses, husbandry specific to that animal, common diseases and ailments of the animal, disease treatment and/or prevention, bio-security (if applicable, gestation length, # of young born, terminology specific to this animal species and the major product(s) from this animal, etc. You will be graded on the scope of material covered, participation in the presentation, and questions asked of presenters. Please be creative and put some effort into this – you will be providing the class with a large amount of knowledge that they will be tested over. Please provide a brief handout/guided notes because this will be helpful to your classmates.

2). Animal Issues article/discussion. Please find an article dealing with an issue in Animal agriculture. You will share this article with the class and have an active discussion over the article. Turn the article into me after the discussion. **This article is due September 23rd.**

3). Temple Grandin research paper. This woman has done a tremendous amount for the livestock industry including research and understanding how animals think. I have read a few of her books and her research and advice has helped me understand why pigs do what they do. In your paper please include who this woman is, how she got where she is today, what she does, her background, experiences, what she has done for the livestock industry, etc. This paper needs to be 3-4 pages in length, no more than 1.5 spacing, Times New Roman font, double spaced. Please include an additional page for resources. ***This paper is due November 16th.***

4). Brief **individual presentations** on a career in animal science that you have researched. You will need to interview at least one person in that field and discuss what you learned from them, what this person does, why you are or are not interested in that career, starting salary for that career in this area, what they do in a typical day, etc. Topics must be pre-approved by the instructor. There will need to be a minimum of 2 reputable, cited sources. Presentations will be approximately 8- 10 minutes long with up to 5 additional minutes allowed for questions. Students will be graded on their presentations and on questions asked of others. ***Due November 30th.***

Behavior and Participation:

Use common sense when it comes to classroom rules. No cell phones, texting, Facebook, Twitter, etc. If you are disruptive, I will ask you to leave and you will not get credit for the day.

Be respectful of each other. Argument and debate are an important part of classroom discussions. However, putting someone down or not considering others' ideas is not acceptable behaviors. Give everyone equal attention and respect during discussions.

Bring your books, something to take notes with, and the most recent drafts of your assignments to class every day.

Attendance:

Attendance is required in this class, not for my benefit, but for yours. Good attendance is one of the main concerns of employers. Being present and participating in classroom activities will greatly contribute to your learning experience. We will be doing work in class and it will be beneficial to your grade if you are there. Plan to attend. High school students are required to attend even if your local high school is not in session that day. Circumstances sometimes arise that require you to miss class. If you need to miss class, you will be responsible for any material you may have missed. I expect you to be prepared for the next class. Any work done in class (group activities, peer reviews, etc.) cannot be made up. If you miss class, you miss the opportunity to earn those points. Coming in late or leaving early is disruptive to the class. If you must come in late or leave early, do so in the least disruptive manner possible.

Submitting Assignments:

Assignments will be turned in via Blackboard. Assignments need to be your own work. If I feel that an assignment has been plagiarized, I can submit it to Turnitin. Turnitin will compare it to thousands of documents on the internet. We will go over how to submit assignments in class.

Save your work in more than one place: your computer hard drive, a memory stick/flash drive, or burn to a CD. Computer crashes happen and do not excuse you from meeting deadlines.

Late Work:

Deadlines need to be met. Do your best to stay on top of your assignments.

I will accept major assignments up to one week late. However, 10% will be deducted from the grade. No other assignments will be accepted late. Exceptions may be made on an individual basis.

Plagiarism and Academic Integrity:

Edison Community College expects students to submit original work for each assignment. The Student Handbook <http://www.edisonohio.edu/index.php?page=student-handbook>, pages 48-51 clearly defines academic dishonesty and how Edison handles cases of academic dishonesty.

Plagiarism is generally accepted as being any the following:

- 1) Copying and pasting text from any electronic media or website, transcribing text from any printed material
- 2) Using words, phrases, information, or ideas from any print, electronic, or audio-visual media without proper citation or acknowledgement of the source
- 3) Using passages from other texts while only changing a few select words within that passage
- 4) Submitting work that originates from another student or commercial source such as a paper mill
- 5) Resubmitting an assignment used in another class without the expressed permission from the current and previous instructor
- 6) Translating a work from one language to another without proper quotations and citations.

Consequences for plagiarism can vary by instructor, but can include failure for the assignment or failure for the course. The instructor is not obligated to provide opportunities to make up a failed assignment due to plagiarism. In addition, since it is difficult for an instructor to determine instances of accidental plagiarism from intentional plagiarism, it is incumbent upon students to use all available resources to guard themselves against plagiarizing. These resources include Turnitin.com, the Learning Center, and the instructor. Instructors will provide students opportunities to fix occurrences of plagiarism before final submission.

Any assignment found to be plagiarized will receive a zero.

One of the features of Turnitin, the system where you will submit your essays, is an originality check. Turnitin will compare your essay to thousands of papers, websites, and other sources. This class will make use of that function. You will be able to view the originality reports as well. This is a good learning tool to help you understand plagiarism and using sources within your paper.

If you have any questions about plagiarism, please ask. I am more than happy to help you properly cite and paraphrase your sources. Please ask **before** your assignment is due.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) Policy

There are a variety of AI programs available to assist writers. AI programs are **not** a replacement for human creativity, originality, and critical thinking. Writing, like any skill, must be developed through practice over time. I encourage you to use AI (such as Word Editor) to help you with spelling and grammar.

However, the majority of any submission should be created by the student. Students may not, for example, type a question into an AI platform and copy and paste its response.

Any AI assistance other than basic editing should be tracked and cited within the assignment. A guide to tracking and citing AI will be included with the MLA resources in Blackboard.

Submitting AI-generated work without identifying it as such will be considered academic dishonesty and students will be subject to removal from and failure of this course.
