

Holiday Evening at Edison State

The 21st annual Holiday Evening at Edison State will feature New York City Brass Band Lucky Chops on Wednesday, November 28 at the Piqua Campus. The Holiday Evening event is held annually to support student scholarship opportunities. New for this year, Holiday Evening at Edison State will hold music education clinics for local junior and high school jazz enthusiast the next day on Thursday, November 29.

Five member brass band Lucky Chops will be changing things up at this year's Holiday Evening with their redefined sound and energy. Originating in 2006 the band got their start by performing in the New York City Subway System and went viral in 2015 after a South American Tourist posted their performance online.

From there the band began touring in Europe, and appeared as the house band for a season on MTV's hit talk show "Girl Code Live". One of Lucky Chops' favorite activities is visiting schools across the globe and holding masterclasses to inspire younger generations of musicians.

The annual holiday event has previously included performances by renowned musicians The Texas Tenors, The Manhattan Transfer, The Return, Australia's The Ten Tenors, Straight No Chaser, Doc Severinson, and four-time Emmy Award winner and two-time Grammy nominee, John Tesh.

Proceeds from the evening will directly benefit the Edison Foundation Scholarship Fund to support Edison State students. Edison State Enrollment Continues to Rise

For the past five semesters, Edison State Community College has met or exceeded its increased enrollment goals. Enrollment this spring has been no exception as Edison State has experienced a 10% increase in overall headcount.

"The sustained enrollment increase at Edison State really speaks to our commitment to quality in all areas from our safe and well-maintained facilities, and through to our effective support services," said Edison State President, Dr. Doreen Larson.

The college's increase in enrollment has been driven by two major factors: College Credit Plus (CCP) enrollment and an increase in enrollment at the Darke County Campus.

Since the State of Ohio launched CCP in 2014, Edison State has experienced a consistent increase in enrollment. This spring, CCP students accounted for 32% of the College's overall enrollment. CCP affords students the opportunity to earn college and high school credit concurrently, accelerating their college careers at little to no cost to them.

"More and more students are graduating with an associate degree before graduating from high school," said Velina Bogart, Coodinator of College Credit Plus. "This is a goal many students are taking advantage of and knock off two years of a bachelor's degree."

Agriculture Program Sees First Graduates

The Edison State Community College Darke County Campus witnessed their first two agriculture graduates receive their diplomas during the college's 43rd annual commencement ceremony. Mr. Wyatt King, of Greenville, and Mr. Logan Ressler, of Arcanum, received their Associate of Applied Science degrees in Agriculture on May 11, 2018.

Launched in fall of 2017, the program began with students enrolling in courses such as agribusiness, agricultural finance, international business, animal science, and agronomy, with internship and industry observations required for successful completion. Students in the program are trained to become successful farmers, work in the agriculture industry, or transfer to a four-year institution to pursue various career opportunities upon completion.

With these goals in mind, King plans to return to the family farm immediately to apply the skills and knowledge he gained while enrolled in the program. In addition to farming, King is also a volunteer firefighter with Union City and plans to become an EMT. "Wyatt is a young man that is not afraid of hard work," said Brad Lentz, Agriculture Program Director and Instructor at Edison State. Wyatt is very dedicated to learning and discovering the skills he will need to make his family's farm function at peak performance."



Edison State Professor Receives National Recognition

The American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) recently awarded Edison State Community College professor David Barth with the inaugural Dale P. Parnell Distinguished Faculty designation at the annual AACC national convention in Dallas.

Professor Barth, of Troy, is an Associate Professor of Electronics Engineering Technology at Edison State Community College, a position he has held since 2000. Barth also serves as the Coordinator of the Electronics Engineering Technology program. Barth holds a Master of Science degree in Electronic Engineering from Michigan Technical University.

Named in honor of former AACC President and CEO Dale P. Parnell, the association established the designation to recognize individuals making a difference in the classroom. Nominees must demonstrate passion for the students and the classroom; show a willingness to support students, inside and outside of the classroom; be inclined to participate in college committees; and go above and beyond what is required to ensure that students are successful in their academic endeavors.

"Professor Barth's abilities and passion for teaching are on full display in the classroom," said Edison State President Dr. Doreen Larson. "David works closely with all students to help them understand the course concepts, taking personal responsibility for the success of each student."



"David's love of his discipline is infectious whether he is explaining a difficult concept in electronics, demonstrating how machines on an assembly line are controlled electronically, or helping students to construct a robot for the local "Battle Bots" competition. His care and concern for both the subject matter and each student make him an exemplary college instructor."

Outside of instructing, Barth is consistently looking for ways to improve the Electronics Engineering Technology program at Edison State. In the last year and a half, he has developed a number of new certificate options for students, completed transfer agreements with university and vocational school partners, and revised the program's curriculum to align with the Guided Pathways approach to promoting student success and completion. Additionally, he has served on a number of committees and taken on responsibilities to ensure new initiatives are successful. "Professor Barth is a valued leader of committees and initiatives on campus," added Larson.

The AACC recognized Barth and 49 of his peers with a custom commemorative medal at a private reception with author Jeanette Walls (The Glass Castle). Recipients' names will be showcased on a new AACC Faculty Wall of Distinction.

Taking a slightly different path, Ressler plans to transfer to Wright State University Lake Campus in the fall to complete the last two years of a bachelor's degree in agriculture and eventually return to the family farm while also seeking a job in the agriculture field.

"Logan brings to class a great deal of positivity," said Lentz. "He has the ability to make the class laugh and genuinely makes class fun. Logan has good values and comes from a strong family that will enable him to carry on his family farming tradition."

Course topics include the fundamental practices of board recruitment, strategic planning, staffing, budgeting, evaluation, board meetings, and community awareness.

Creation of the Academy for Community Leadership at Edison State in 2004 was championed by Patricia Duke Robinson as she sought to capture the energy created from the publication of *The Board Member's Guide*. Commissioned by the Duke Foundation, the book examines nonprofit leadership and transforms it into a long-term benefit for the nonprofit leaders in Miami and surrounding counties.

Edison State and the Duke Foundation have continued to support the initiative since then, as part of their long-standing commitment to strengthening regional nonprofit organizations, investing in their leaders, and ensuring that they have access to resources needed to enhance their ability to serve the community. The joint announcement of the naming of the Paul G. Duke Academy for Community Leadership was made on May 23 at Edison State Community College in Piqua. Edison State was represented by Dr. Doreen Larson, president, and Rick Hanes, vice president for business and community partnerships, as well as members of the college's board of trustees and leadership personnel. 
