# Edison State Recognized With Collegiate Purple Star Award



Edison State Community College was recognized with a Collegiate Purple Star Award during a virtual Ohio Department of Higher Education (ODHE) event held on May 26.

Coinciding with Military
Appreciation Month, the virtual event
included representatives from 33
public and independent Ohio colleges
and universities and announced the
first class of institutions to receive the
Collegiate Purple Star designation.
Ohio is the first state to adopt such a
designation.

"The support services provided for military-connected students through Edison State's Office of Veterans Services help ease the transition into higher education and set them on a path to career success. Edison State is a worthy recipient of this first-ever Collegiate Purple Star designation," Chancellor Randy Gardner said.

Unveiled in March of this year, the Collegiate Purple Star Award recognizes public and independent institutions that are "supportive and inclusive of military-connected students." Interested institutions submitted an application, and the Collegiate Purple Star Advisory Committee chose the aspiring military-friendly institutions to receive the designation.

To receive the Collegiate Purple Star designation, institutions must be compliant with House Bill 488. Eligible institutions will have implemented the Keys to Veteran Success and Principles of Excellence, completed institutional training on issues that military-connected students may face, and established policies specifically for veterans. Additionally, institutions will

have a dedicated space for veteran and service-member students, a written policy to strengthen resources for military-connected students, and have a representative regularly attend Ohio Veterans Education Council (OVEC) meetings.

"Edison State is honored to receive the Collegiate Purple Star designation that denotes our commitment to the support and inclusion of military-connected students," said Edison State President Dr. Doreen Larson. "Governor Mike DeWine and Chancellor Randy Gardner have led this initiative and place Ohio at the forefront of state systems that acknowledge the sacrifices and underscore the value of service and skills from our currently serving military and our veterans."

"We view this recognition as another step in assessing our service to our veterans, and we encourage input from our military-connected students regarding ways we can continue to improve," Dr. Larson added.

32% live in Miami County, 23% in Shelby County, and 24% in Darke County.


18 Ohio counties are represented.

## CALCULATING A BRIGHTER FUTURE

Preparing students with the skills needed to excel in today's workplace, the Accounting program at Edison State Community College is the perfect choice for those interested in a career in financial, managerial, or tax accounting. Students in the program learn to compile and analyze business transactions and prepare financial reports.

Led by Associate Professor Sandra Streitenberger, the program has seen a 67.8% five-year increase in student enrollment. Fifty-nine students were enrolled in accounting certificate or degree programs in 2017; by the 2021–22 academic year, that number had grown to 99 students.

Edison State accounting students are members of the Institute of Management Accountants (IMA); each year, they attend an IMA virtual leadership conference and an IMA Educational Student Night. Students also provide host/liaison services for the annual Women in STEMM Expo, where they're assigned to a business partner from the community for a day.

Streitenberger and her team have helped Edison State establish partnerships with four local high schools and numerous area business

employers. Creating a channel with these employers has led to placing students and alumni in over 50 accounting jobs since April 2021. It's also placed students in over 50 internships with companies such as Midmark Corporation, Brock Air Products, and Manning and Associates CPA.

"The ongoing community outreach from faculty and students has facilitated an open funnel for employers actively seeking accountants," Streitenberger said. "Employers have a growing reliance on Edison State to develop accounting candidates for the increasing demand in the community."

"Whether you're looking for part- or full-time work, interested in a long-term position, or trying to fulfill your internship requirement, the available job offers seem to keep coming," said accounting student Mike Waugh.

To ensure students are prepared for this in-demand career field, Streitenberger and her team continue to focus on community outreach and business partnerships with service-learning projects, job shadowing, internships, and community-based networking opportunities. Some recent partnerships include those with Piqua Community Foundation, Partners in Hope and Dayton Coalition (VITA/EITC), and the Troy Senior Citizens Center.

During the Piqua Community
Foundation's Shark Tank–style Pitch
Piqua event, Edison State accounting
students volunteered as a non-partisan
group of auditors to count the votes.
They kept track of live voting by the
community and event judges for each
contestant's presentation.

Accounting students prepare taxes for the community at large as part of a service-learning project at the Partners in Hope site location and in partnership with the Dayton Coalition (VITA/EITC). Students must be IRS-certified and volunteer for 20 on-site service-learning hours.

The Troy Senior Center provides students with a firsthand glimpse of

audit life. Established 17 years ago, this partnership brings in Edison State students to perform independent evaluations of accounting records, providing students with improved entrylevel skills.

"The internship I found through the program was a great start to my accounting career," said alumna Hallie Snyder. "I'm still at the same company I completed my internship with and have been promoted to accounting manager. I wouldn't have been prepared for this position without the wonderful education I received and the guidance of the professors in the program."

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), employment of accountants and auditors is projected to grow seven percent between 2020 and 2030. An average of approximately 135,000 job openings are projected for each year over the decade. Pay projections range from \$66k to \$134k.

"Accounting will always be necessary," Streitenberger said. "If you enjoy numbers and crunching figures, there's no better career for you."

## History in the Making

## CHARGER ATHLETICS HAVE HISTORIC SEASON

Edison State Community College's softball and baseball teams recently wrapped up successful regular seasons, and both qualified for postseason play. Their advancement marks the first time in Edison State history that all athletic teams earned postseason bids to play during their sport's respective National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) tournament.

"What we're building here at Edison State with our athletic programs is only the beginning," said Athletics Director Nate Cole. "We believe what we're accomplishing is going to be the standard that all other community colleges will see as the blueprint to model their athletic programs after."

The 2021–22 seasons kicked off with volleyball this past fall. The Lady Chargers finished their season 12-11 overall and 7-4 in the Ohio Community College Athletic Conference (OCCAC). The team participated in postseason play at the NJCAA Great Lakes District Tournament this past November.

Both the men's and women's basketball teams had dominating seasons, with the women's basketball team finishing the regular season undefeated and clinching the OCCAC championship title. The Lady Chargers advanced to the NJCAA Great Lakes District C Championship and ranked #18 in the NJCAA Division II Women's Basketball Rankings.

The men's basketball team finished the season 20-9 overall and 7-5 in the OCCAC, advancing in the quarter- and semi-finals to compete in the NJCAA Great Lakes District C Championship in March.







The Charger baseball team finished their season 28-21 overall and 15-9 in the OCCAC. They claimed the subdistrict championship and won at the NJCAA Region XII Great Lakes District DII Tournament, advancing to the NJCAA Region XII Baseball Championship held on May 19.

Finishing the season 28-15-3 overall and 15-6-1 in the OCCAC, the softball team competed in the NJCAA Great Lakes District A Softball Championship. The tournament was held on May 12–13 in Stevensville, MI.

"I want to thank all faculty, staff, administration, maintenance, and everyone associated with Edison State Athletics for everything they do for the Athletic Department," Cole added. "I especially want to thank the coaches for their leadership and support. Most of all, I thank the student-athletes for their dedication to academic



and athletic success. They represent Edison State with class, pride, and sportsmanship."



# Developing Skills to Support Regional Manufacturing



According to The Ohio Manufacturers' Association, Ohio manufacturing is responsible for almost 17% of Ohio's Gross Domestic Product and contributes to the quality of life in the state. Edison State Community College recognizes the need for skilled manufacturing technicians throughout the region and offers several program options to increase the skills needed to support manufacturing. One such program is the short-term CNC Machine Tool Operator Training Program.

This six-month program equips employees with the skills needed to be successful CNC operators by offering a blend of online learning and handson validation learning labs. The CNC operator sets up and operates a variety of computer-controlled machine tools to fabricate precision parts and instruments while applying the knowledge of mechanics, shop mathematics, metal properties, layouts, and machining procedures. The program is divided into five subject areas and hands-on labs: Safety, Math, & Measurements; Manual Mill; Manual Lathe; CNC Mill; and CNC Lathe.

Online courses for the program are completed with learning management system partner Tooling U-SME, and hands-on validation skills labs are performed with experienced and knowledgeable instructors reinforcing the learning process. Upon a student's successful completion, a CNC Machine Tool Operator certificate and seven academic credits are awarded; these credits may be applied toward an academic certificate or associate degree under the Mechanical Engineering career pathway.

A valuable opportunity for employers looking to upskill their current workforce or individuals pursuing career advancement, the CNC Machine Tool Operator Training Program helps participants build the knowledge and skills needed for a fast-paced manufacturing environment.

Karyn Gibson is a team member at Crane Pumps & Systems in Piqua, a creator of innovative pump solutions that allow for effective, efficient transport of wastewater. Crane sent Gibson through the CNC Machine Tool Operator Training Program at Edison State from May to November 2021. After completing the program, she went from being an assembler in the production department to training as a CNC operator/machinist.

"By completing the program, I gained a knowledge of different precision measuring devices and could practice how to use them correctly," Gibson said. "The program is flexible, so you can learn and study on your own schedule."

"Karyn has done really well with her CNC training," said Bobbie Cota, HR Manager at Crane. "The program at Edison State has helped us gain a valuable machinist who will continue to grow and develop."

Ohio manufacturing provides almost 700,000 jobs with excellent potential for Ohio workers and, at \$43 billion, the highest total annual wages of any Ohio industry sector. In 2018, the average annual wage for Ohio workers in manufacturing was \$61,500.

The Edison State CNC Machine Tool Operator Training Program is eligible for funding from the Ohio Department of Higher Education. The Short-Term Technical Certificate Grant awards up to \$2,000 per student or employee. The program is also eligible for TechCred, an incumbent worker training program geared toward alleviating training costs for employers.

## Helping High School Students Navigate College

High school is different than it used to be. Previously, a student focused on grades, sports, or who would be their date to the next dance. These days, local students are also creating education plans to get ahead academically and save money by enrolling in Edison State's prestigious College Credit Plus (CCP) program. CCP gives students a wealth of opportunities—academically, financially, and socially—by allowing students to receive both college and high school credit at the same time. Students take college courses in person at any campus location, online, and, for many students, even at their own high school.

Through CCP, students get ahead academically by taking general education courses that are guaranteed to transfer to public Ohio universities—and many credits can transfer nationwide. Some students stay with Edison State after high school graduation to complete their associate degree before transferring to a four-year university. Others focus on courses in career pathways such as Business or Computer Information Systems so they can pursue a specific career program. In any case, students save financially since they can be eligible for free or low-cost college credits through CCP.

Edison State's Enrollment Managers visit high schools daily to guide students in person on how to qualify for CCP, advise about classes, and map out individualized plans to help students meet their future career goals.

Staffing at Edison State saw major changes this past year, as we introduced three new Enrollment Managers, as well as a Director of Enrollment Management at the Piqua Campus, Ethan Tauscher. Tauscher works with Rachel Carlisle, Director of Regional Campus Enrollment Management & Student Services, bringing CCP Enrollment Managers together to reflect on how to best serve CCP students, families, and counselors.

Carlisle says, "The college admission process can be overwhelming for new students and families. However, personal assistance throughout these steps can help students feel comfortable with their choice to pursue higher education and ensure they have a solid understanding of what is involved in the endeavor."

Chad Beanblossom, Vice President of Enrollment Management and Regional Campus Operations, oversees the Enrollment Management division and enjoys seeing the collaboration of the team

Dr. Loleta Collins was introduced as Assistant Dean of College Credit Plus Academics. She assists Dr. Paul Heintz, Jr., Dean of Arts and Sciences, with all items on the academic side of the house so CCP courses can be conducted at the high school site. Dr. Heintz reviews the educational credentials of high school teachers; and if they qualify, they're certified to teach with Edison State. The course is then revamped to align with Edison State's college curriculum. Currently, 33 school districts have Edison State CCP courses taught on-site at their location.

Dr. Heintz says, "We require that all courses are comparable in content and rigor regardless of where that Edison State course is offered. It is Edison State's goal to not only provide CCP students with a quality education experience but to also provide them with skills

and knowledge they can use in the future, whether that involves workforce development or continuing their higher learning education."

Through the recent staffing changes, the high schools that Enrollment Managers visit were reassigned and now reflect a new territory map divided into seven regions from northern Mercer County to the southern region of Preble County. When visiting students, Enrollment Managers first ask what career field they're interested in pursuing. Sometimes students don't know just yet, and that's all right! Enrollment Managers walk them through how to access engaging Career Services at Edison State and take practical subjects, and they talk about internship and apprenticeship opportunities to help students determine what they'd ultimately like to do in the future.

Hollie Ahrens, a school counselor at Versailles High School, shares, "Edison State's service model provides schools and students with essential support. Without having Edison State on our high school campus to help students with everything from applying, to registration, to transitioning after high school, I do not think our CCP program would be as successful. It is essential for school counselors to work with Edison State staff to help ensure that students are given as many opportunities as possible while also making sure they are meeting high school graduation requirements."

Enrollment Managers not only help CCP students during their high school visits but also any student interested in Edison State's programs. They have extensive knowledge to assist Career-Technical students pursuing credits with career centers and are excited to provide critical information and next steps for students who would like to attend Edison State after high school graduation.

There are many new faces this year, but the spirit remains the same: the Edison State team is friendly and dedicated to helping students. They want to ensure the college process is more fun and easier to navigate so students can be successful and make their career aspirations a reality.

I was able to explain the personal trials I was experiencing and the special attention then given to me to help me succeed in my education. As a result, I graduated with high honors and more than an education in human services but also life."

After graduating from Edison State in 1995 with an Associate of Applied Business in Paralegal Studies, Suzanne began her career interning at Elsass, Wallace, Evans, Schnelle & Co., LPA in Sidney, Ohio. She then accepted a position at Miami County Children's Services (MCCS) where she was a paralegal to the on-site attorney. While at MCCS, she also served as a Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) with Miami County courts. When the MCCS attorney retired, Suzanne started working at Kerrigan, Boller, Stevenson & Goettemoeller & Co., LPA, also in Sidney. This firm was part private law firm and part of the Shelby County Prosecutor's office. Suzanne then expanded her law knowledge and began working at Dyer, Garofalo, Mann, & Schultz in Dayton, where she became manager of their northern offices, including Richmond, Indiana. After seven years working with the firm, she decided to work closer to home and began working at McCulloch, Felger, Fite, & Gutmann Co., LPA in Piqua. In 2010, Suzanne retired to care for her husband and spend more time with family.

After graduating from high school, Chad joined the Johnson Township–St. Paris Volunteer Fire Department. He later graduated from Edison State in May 1997 with an Associate of Science. Later, he transferred to Wright State University, graduating in 1999 summa cum laude as an Honor's Scholar with a major in psychology before taking a position with the Piqua Fire Department. Over the next 15 years, he was promoted to Captain and then Assistant Chief of the fire department. While there, he completed a paramedic to RN transition program at Clark State, gained his BSN at Ohio University, and then completed the PMHNP Masters of Science program at Wright State University, ultimately becoming a Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner. Today, Chad serves as a Captain in the U.S. Army Reserves with a Combat and Operational Stress Control medical detachment and as an adjunct faculty member for a Master-level PMHNP program.

Danell Shirey started her journey with Edison State in 2003 when she participated in the dual-enrollment program, now known as College Credit Plus, as a high school student. During that time, she focused on responsibility and how to be more proactive as college demanded it. Shirey later became a physical therapy assistant at Dayton Children's Hospital, then shifted gears during the COVID pandemic by starting a position in the Guidance Office at Lehman Catholic High School. In this role, she assists the school counselor with many projects and helps current CCP students with their next steps in the program, making her journey with CCP come full circle. She enjoys Edison State's positive environment and says there are "friendly people and great instructors" on campus. Shirey recently re-enrolled at Edison State and will complete her Medical Coder Certificate this summer. She adds, "If I hadn't gone to Edison State, I wouldn't have met my husband." They have two children and enjoy camping, fishing, and hiking as a family.

## **Edison State Stands Ready**

#### INTEL

Ohio Governor Mike DeWine and Lt. Governor Jon Husted recently announced that Ohio would become home to two leading-edge Intel chip manufacturing facilities. Intel's \$20 billion investment will help boost production to meet the surging demand for advanced semiconductors.

As the largest single private-sector investment in Ohio history, the initial phase of the project is expected to create 3,000 Intel jobs, 7,000 construction jobs over the course of the build, and support tens of thousands of additional local long-term jobs across a broad ecosystem of suppliers and partners.

Edison State Community College is prepared to play a pivotal role in providing necessary education to support the project. "This project results from extraordinary leadership by Governor DeWine and Lt. Governor Husted. They succeeded in fueling an economic vision that rises above the COVID challenges to focus on the future. The future of Ohio is bright, and Edison State is excited to play a role in this newest initiative," said Dr. Doreen Larson, President of Edison State.

Edison State offers associate degrees

in the Engineering and Manufacturing Career Pathway and numerous certificates and short-term technical certificates that support workforce development within the related career field. Edison State's recently launched 25&UP Finish Fast tuition waiver further supports the development of the state's workforce by waiving 100% of tuition cost for adults in Ohio pursuing an accelerated degree, certificate, or short-term technical certificate from Edison State.

To support the development of the new site, Intel pledged an additional \$100 million toward partnerships with educational institutions to build a pipeline of talent and bolster research programs in the region.

#### **SEMCORP**

A major producer of electric vehicle battery components, SEMCORP recently announced plans to invest \$916 million in a Sidney, Ohio, manufacturing complex.

According to the State of Ohio's website, SEMCORP Manufacturing USA LLC expects to create 1,199 full-time positions, generating \$73 million in new annual payroll as a result of the company's new project in Sidney.

SEMCORP manufactures separator film used within lithium-ion batteries. The company's main focus is within the EV battery market with business also in consumer electronics and energy storage systems. The TCA approved a 2.095 percent, 15-year Job Creation Tax Credit for this project.

SEMCORP will be located at the Industrial Park at Millcreek and Kuther Road. The site, which has been authenticated by JobsOhio's SiteOhio program since 2021, has been flagged for major industrial development since 2016. This status ensures the site is free of any detriments that may slow or stop development. The 850,000-square-foot facility is the largest foreign direct investment in Ohio.

"Edison State stands ready to educate and develop the workforce that will be needed to run these new Intel and SEMCORP facilities and the many hightech support companies that are sure to move into the region as additional suppliers. Edison State's programs in the Engineering and Manufacturing Career Pathway specialize in realworld educational experiences, using cutting-edge technology and a handson approach to learning," said Chris Spradlin, Executive Vice President and Provost of Edison State.

## Reverse Raffle Raises Scholarship Dollars for Charger Athletics







#### **EVENT RAISES \$23,492**

Supporters recently came together at Edison State Community College's Piqua Campus for the 12th annual Charger Athletics Reverse Raffle fundraiser to support Edison State Athletics. Over 250 people were in attendance, which awarded one lucky ticket holder the \$10,000 grand prize.

This year's event brought in \$23,492.99 for the athletics program through the sale of tickets, a silent auction, and other activities. Nearly \$15,000 in prize money was awarded to winning ticket holders, including the grand prize winner, Buckeye Charters, Ltd.

"The money we raise through this event helps offset many of the costs that our athletic teams incur throughout the year. It also provides a lot of opportunities our studentathletes may not normally have, such as traveling to and participating in postseason tournaments," said Nate Cole, Edison State Athletics Director. Over 25 additional items were available in a silent auction that were donated by area businesses, community members, and athletic teams, which also contributed to the funds raised.

"We had a tremendous outpouring of support from people in the community and right here at Edison State, and we can't thank them enough for making the event successful," said Cole.

"This was a great event with a lot of winners," added Dr. Rick Hanes, VP of Advancement, Strategic Planning, and Partnerships & Executive Director of The Edison Foundation. "We'd like to thank all of the supporters of the Edison State Athletics Department and The Edison Foundation."

Originally known as the Charger 300, the Charger Athletics Reverse Raffle began in 2010 to provide funding for postseason play and offset expenses beyond the Edison

State Athletics budget. The need for an annual fundraiser for the athletic department grew from the Charger teams winning National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Region XII titles, District G titles, and moving on to compete at the NJCAA Division III Final Four.

Over the past seven years, \$123,319.54 raised from previous Charger athletic reverse raffle events have been used to purchase team uniforms and equipment, provide team facility upgrades, and cover expenses associated with postseason play.

Edison State's volleyball, men's and women's basketball, baseball, and softball teams compete in the Ohio Community College Athletic Conference (OCCAC) and are Division II members of the NJCAA.

## CCP/Career-Tech Tuition Waiver

Edison State Community College continues to assist high school graduates with a new College Credit Plus (CCP)/Career-Technology tuition waiver. The waiver covers 100% of the tuition for students who have completed at least six credit hours through CCP, articulated coursework, Career-Technical Assurance Guide (CTAG), or any combination.

"Edison State highly values students who take on college-level work while in high school, and we want to encourage them to continue their college career with us," said Edison State President Dr. Doreen Larson. "The waiver covers students at all high schools, including career and technical education centers. Students and their families can leverage this waiver

to attain degrees and certificates at Edison State, as well as complete the first two years of a four-year degree with no tuition cost."

The 100% tuition waiver is available to students who complete at least six credit hours of CCP or articulated coursework, including CTAG, at a partner institution; submit a Major Declaration Form; register for summer, fall, or spring semester classes immediately after graduation; file their FAFSA; and stay enrolled until the completion of their degree or 70 total credit hours.

Edison State has formed strong partnerships with area high schools and career-technical centers to create a smooth transition for high school students entering college. CCP continues to thrive as 33 area high schools have partnered with Edison State to host collegiate-level courses and students from 47 high schools are attending classes on campus. Local career-technical students also continue to benefit from robust articulation agreements developed with Edison State

Students receiving the waiver will have 100% of their tuition covered, which includes instructional, general, technology, activity, and career services fees. Any financial aid awarded to the student will pay first. Lab fees for individual courses, security fees, textbooks, and additional fees will be the students' responsibility.
