

Update on Nursing



A TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE

Edison State Community College's nursing program provides students with the quality education needed to enter the workforce as confident, prepared healthcare providers.

The two-year Associate of Applied Science Nursing degree program became available in 1980, and the first class graduated in 1982. Over the past 39 years, the program has added a track for licensed practical nurses to enter the program with advanced credit status (1986), conducted an evening sequence of classes (1992-1996), converted from quarters to semesters (1993-1994), increased the number of students admitted by starting two cohorts each year (2007-

2008), and subsequently increased the number of full-time faculty.

Over the years, students have entered the program for various reasons. Some students know they want to pursue a healthcare career straight out of high school, while others are looking for a career change. Regardless of their current circumstance, these students have a proven desire to give back by helping others.

As students begin their educational journey to becoming nurses through hands-on classroom learning, they must complete clinical experience. They begin doing so in their first semester with one of three long-term

care facilities in the area. During the next two semesters, they attend clinicals in the hospital setting with an Edison State faculty or adjunct as part of a clinical group. Their final semester is spent in a 96-hour practicum with a nurse that is employed by each facility. This nurse works as a preceptor and is partnered with the student for patient care.

Through this combination of classroom work and clinicals, graduates receive the Associate of Applied Science degree. They are then eligible to take the National Licensure Examination (NCLEX) for licensure as a registered nurse.

Graduates of the nursing program have earned upwards of a 100-percent NCLEX pass rate each semester, proving its rigorous approach successful. The last graduating cohort in May 2020 earned a 100-percent pass rate, surpassing the national average pass rate for first-time test takers of 83.77-percent and the state pass rate average of 86.35-percent.

Not only have Edison State nursing graduates maintained a high pass rate on the NCLEX, but they've also proven successful in securing employment. For the last few semesters, graduates of the program have secured a 100-percent employment rate, an achievement that is no coincidence.

Edison State also has the only associate degree program that partners with Premier Health for the capstone Versant residency. This partnership allows students to apply to the capstone Versant program and then have the opportunity to hire into a Versant residency when they graduate,

providing them with the opportunity to explore various areas of nursing. Edison State also partners with Kettering Health Network by taking students to the new Troy Hospital and Grandview Hospital for clinical experience.

The Associate Degree Nursing program at Edison State is accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) and approved by the Ohio Board of Nursing, the highest level of approval a program can receive. •

Going above and beyond the call of duty, Edison State instructors are often found supporting organizations and individuals in our area communities.

VOLUNTEERING TO HONOR VETERANS

Veterans interface with us daily, yet few have ever had their stories written, shared, and archived so that they will be available for future generations. For a decade now, Edison State students, under the guidance of instructor Dr. Vivian Blevins, have been recording these stories. Blevins publishes her stories via Aim Media Midwest and in several newspapers south of the Ohio River. In each of her Edison State classes, she gives students the option of interviewing and writing these patriotic men and women's accounts.

"When I teach Fundamentals of Communication, I encourage my students to enroll for internships at the Miami Valley Veterans Museum. Additionally, the stories I write and those of my students are archived at the Piqua Public Library and the Museum. Included in those collections are 43 videos my students and I produced for the Library of Congress Veterans History Project, thus, there is also a global access for some of the work."

Blevins, who sees value in honoring veterans, assists with the Miami County Fourth of July parade and various other museum programs in addition to writing much of the monthly Museum newsletter. Adjunct instructor Vince Miller has also spent several months as a volunteer for the Miami Valley Veterans Museum. The Museum has recently been dedicating resources to renovating the old Chrysler dealership buildings located on South 25A. Volunteers, including Miller, have been involved with numerous handson tasks including, building spaces, refurbishing floors, adding new lighting, painting, and more to prepare the Museum to move from their downtown Troy location to 25A earlier this fall.

Adjunct instructor Carl DeSantis, a veteran himself, has been heavily involved with the Museum for a number of years, serving in a multitude of roles, including on the Museum's Board of Directors.

HELPING TO PRESERVE A HISTORICAL TREASURE

Adjunct faculty members Carl DeSantis and Lin Roberts, along with faculty member Levi Smith serve on a working board at The Historic Bear's Mill in Darke County. This great old fully operating grist mill has been a major historical treasure of Darke County since 1849.

Bear's Mill's grand framework is constructed of exquisite hand hewn timber beams that are nearly 50 feet long. Standing four stories high, grain is carried from floor to floor throughout the inner workings of the Mill by the power of the water that runs through the mill race below.

Managed and maintained by the Friends of Bear's Mill, today's Mill offers an exciting place to experience a bit of history in a strikingly beautiful setting. The first floor of Bear's Mill is a celebration of food, nature, and art. The Mill Market carries an eclectic mix of Bear's Mill flours and meals, gourmet food items, coffee, clothing, jewelry, and unique home goods. The Mill Gallery features rotating exhibits that display the paintings, sculpture and photography of artists throughout the Ohio Valley.

Terry Clark serves as the Master Miller, and his wife, Julie is the "Master" Potter with the Mill Race Potters and the Clark Gallery.

Employees Graduate from Leadership Academy

Two leaders from Edison State Community College have graduated as fellows of the first Ohio Leadership Academy for Student Success.

Dr. Amanda Bylczynski, Assistant Dean of Accreditation and Academic Effectiveness, and Rachel Carlisle, Director of Regional Campus Enrollment Management and Student Services, were among more than 40 leaders representing all of Ohio's community colleges that graduated Oct. 2, 2020, as part of the academy, organized by the Ohio Association of Community Colleges (OACC). It is the first of its kind in the

nation to gather mid-level administrators, faculty, and staff for a year of training, exchanging ideas and immersion in how to promote student success.

"The fellows learned how to more effectively lead the many changes underway at our colleges—transformational changes—to improve student success," said Laura Rittner, executive director of the OACC's Success Center for Ohio Community Colleges. "We brought together people who have different roles at colleges so they could have a deeper understanding of how college leaders can work together to usher in these student success models."

The president of each of the state's community colleges could nominate two employees as fellows. They met six times throughout the year for two-day meetings, first in person and then online as the pandemic took hold. Sessions were relevant to Ohio specifically and included aspects of the Aspen Institute's presidential leadership curriculum. Fellows also worked on projects in small groups between sessions.

Dr. Bylczynski stated, "I am so thankful I was able to be part of the inaugural class. The academy was a wonderful opportunity to collaborate with colleagues from around the state about issues and trends in higher education surrounding student success. My experience of working with these leaders and learning from the OACC training sessions has helped me to redefine my views of leadership, and the roles faculty can play as leaders in the community college."

Carlisle echoed Dr. Bylczynski's sentiments. "Participating in the OACC Leadership Academy provided me with a wealth of knowledge that I will be able to utilize throughout my career in higher education, and I appreciated that the academy focused on using leadership to positively influence student success. I felt that the concepts and best practices reviewed in the academy aligned with Edison State's ongoing efforts to provide the best support services possible to our students, with postgraduation success in mind."

Workforce Updates

The Center for Workforce Development and Education focuses primarily on training incumbent workers; therefore, the local employers are customers. Last year the Center served approximately 80 companies and trained nearly 1,100 employees. Its staff includes Keith Barga and John Hittepole, who conduct training for manufacturers in Edison State engineering labs or on-site at companies. Trisha Elliott is the Project Specialist, which means she is the glue that holds the department together. The team is led by the Director, Peggy Wiggins, who will be retiring at the close of 2020. Brandi Olberding, Director of Apprenticeships and Work Based

Learning, will step into Peggy's role in the new year.

The advisory committee is made up of the following individuals: Eric Campbell, Crane Pumps; Rich Brenner, KTH; Rick Ridgeway, ORBIS Corporation; Matt Schwieterman, Emerson; Matt Stephens, Ramco Electric Motors; and Advanced Composites, in addition to the staff of the Center.

The Center has seen an increase in training for skilled positions in manufacturing in the last 2-3 years and expects that trend to continue for the foreseeable future. Training in soft skills has also been robust.

High-Quality Online Programs Pay-Off for Edison State



COLLEGE SEES ENROLLMENT INCREASE DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC

With a deep commitment to student satisfaction, Edison State Community College continues to make great strides in student fulfillment by increasing online learning opportunities. Years of faculty development, investments in online software and equipment, and online teaching and learning have not only positioned the college for success during the COVID-19 pandemic, but they have also contributed to a growth in enrollment.

This semester, Edison State has experienced an increase of 7.1-percent in overall headcount and a 11.7-percent in credit hours. These increases

demonstrate that online classes are becoming more popular, and students are enrolling full-time or taking an increased number of credit hours.

A 2016 student enrollment survey indicated that many students sought assurance that a degree or certificate could be completed entirely online. According to survey results, even if students have one or two courses required on campus, it created barriers to completion. Edison State responded, and every degree and certificate were reviewed with the goal of 100-percent online availability.

After years of strategic investment and faculty preparation, Edison State rolled out a 2018 fall course schedule highlighting online course offerings and complete online degree options. Online course sections were formatted to roll out new sections as needed

eliminating student waitlists and delays in schedule changes. Curriculum changes were completed that resulted in many new degree and certificate programs available through all online courses.

Increases in fall 2018 and fall 2019 enrollments indicated that Edison State had made the right move. Online registration in fall 2018 increased by 28-percent, and likewise, fall enrollment in 2019 was up by an additional 5-percent. Overall, Edison State has had steady enrollment growth since 2015.

Edison State President, Dr. Doreen Larson, explains, "Our response to the COVID-19 pandemic did not require a complete and disruptive shift in teaching and learning. For us, the COVID-19 pandemic accelerated our trajectory towards our goal of 100-percent online program availability."

"Students in Edison State online courses immediately experience the high levels of faculty engagement, individual feedback and support, and flexibility in learning and assessment that are the hallmarks of high-quality, highly effective online teaching and learning for both full -time and adjunct faculty. These quality factors take the faculty's time and dedication to develop and master," Larson added.

Edison State continues to highlight faculty professional development as Strategic Priority supported by a college Priority Project. Continued pursuit of innovation and excellence in all courses remains a top issue for all faculty and student support areas of the college.

Athletics Update



After consulting with college and local health experts, Edison State Community College is suspending its participation in NJCAA-sanctioned indoor sports for the 2020-2021 season. Intercollegiate competition for women's and men's basketball and women's volleyball will be deferred to next year. Inter-squad competition and team practices will continue in the spring of 2021 for these programs.

The factors influencing this decision were concerns over the unpredictable nature of the COVID-19 pandemic in the coming months and the impact this has on the College's ability to ensure the athletes' safety, the reduced number of other colleges with active athletics programs remaining, and the reliance on limited indoor spaces for these athletes.

Edison State President Dr. Doreen Larson states, "Edison State has successfully provided a safe practice environment for our indoor athletes, and we are confident that we can continue that environment in the spring of 2021. We cannot assure that same level of safety for our athletes or athletes from other programs if we introduce intercollegiate competition."

Edison State Athletics Director Nate Cole commented, "This action to suspend 2020-21 indoor sports seasons until next fall, affecting men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball, is a tough call for all coaches and athletes. This was a difficult decision because athletics are a vital part of recruitment and student success initiatives at Edison State."

"Scholarship commitments to new or returning indoor sport student-athletes will be honored in 2020-21, and no student-athlete will be charged a season on eligibility. We will also continue to recruit new student-athletes for the 2021-22 seasons. As with everything we do, the decision to suspend athletics was made with the health and safety of our athletes, coaches, and our entire campus in mind. The college remains committed to helping its student-athletes achieve







their academic goals. Edison State will work with each student-athlete to address specific needs for the upcoming academic year," said Cole.

Dr. Larson continues, "We deeply miss engaging with students at our campuses and, in particular, we miss the joy and energy that our athletes bring to the culture at Edison State. We look forward to the healthy and robust competition that our future holds. However, painful in the short term, we know that we are making the best choice possible for our studentathletes and their families."

ORBIS Corporation, in Urbana, provides reusable plastic containers, pallets, dunnage, and bulk systems. The Center has been partnering with ORBIS for almost five years to create a customized training program for their maintenance technicians. They have sent employees from their various manufacturing facilities in Kansas, Wisconsin, Kentucky, Ohio, and Canada to Edison State's Piqua Campus for hands-on labs in areas such as mechanical systems, industrial electricity, automation, and fabrication. Their employees consistently

comment on the quality of the program and the expertise of their instructors, typically selecting the highest rank in their ratings of the training.

Midmark Corporation, in Versailles, makes medical, dental and veterinary products and provides related services. Since 2011 they have been sending employees to Edison State for a customized CNC Operator Training program we created in partnership with them. The program combines online learning through our partner, Tooling U,

and hands-on labs at our Piqua campus. There are 40 labs hours included in the program, which is six-months in length; labs typically occur once a month after the students begin. Upon completion, the student receives 7 academic credit hours to apply to a program in advanced manufacturing. The Midmark associates have commented on the appropriateness of the program and how it helps them in their work, as well as the knowledge of the instructor and the cleanliness of the labs.

A TRIBUTE TO LOCAL MUSICIANS AND RESTAURANTS

As a former school nurse for the Upper Valley Career Center, Lukey understands the value the education available in Miami County presents to the broader communities served. During her career at Upper Valley, she was charged by Dr. Richard Adams to head the Miami-Shelby Consortium, which was established to provide classroom programs, teen events, and teacher education programs to area schools, a position she held for over 15 years.

Additionally, several of Lukey's family members are Edison State alumni, including her son Jeffrey, late granddaughter Chelsea, and granddaughter Veronica.

"Jeff worked with disabled adults as well as at the alternative school in Sidney. His daughter Chelsea passed away a few months after graduating from Edison State due to a rare form of cancer. She was struggling with this diagnosis from age 14 until her death at 23. She was active in high school as a cheerleader, a Big Sister with the Piqua Chapter, and worked weekends at a nursing home in Wapakoneta, all while going to college and fighting her cancer. Veronica began with an associate degree from Edison State and has since continued her education while working at Wright Patterson Air Force Base, now pursuing a master's degree."

Due to COVID-19, the efforts to respond to community needs made The Edison Foundation Scholarship program even more critical. Proceeds from the event have also be allocated to the new Student Emergency Fund, which aims to help students with unexpected expenditures.

"Of course, the scholarships funded by the Edison Foundation are very important to students in our area. Edison State is a beginning education for many as well as a pathway to a career for others," said Lukey.



Fred Verceles-Leaving a Legacy

The Edison Foundation is honored to announce the establishment of the Fred Verceles Scholarship. The scholarship's initial funding has been made available through generous donations by his wife Linda, other family members, and friends in celebration of Fred Verceles, who passed away on July 29, 2020.

Learning was Fred Verceles' love from an early age. As a young boy, he treasured books from the library. However, his school advisers saw that his family was too poor to send him to college, so they put him in non-college prep classes like art and music, where he excelled. He dropped out of high school his senior year to join the United States Marine Corps, where he was marched into a room to take his GED.

Soon he discovered community colleges. Even though he didn't think he was smart enough to attend, he signed

up for classes. He began to collect credits slowly but surely. Right around the time he was sent to Vietnam, he was notified that he qualified for the Boot Strap Program. He was allowed to go full-time to a university for eighteen months to complete his bachelor's degree, fully paid for by the military.

Soon after, he completed his master's degree on the weekends through the G.I. Bill. After serving for twenty-four years with tours in Vietnam and Okinawa, he retired as a Sergeant Major and applied to teach at Edison State Community College. Starting as an adjunct instructor, he retired fifteen years later as an associate professor.

During his time at Edison State, he had two responsibilities outside of classroom teaching. He went to workplaces in the tri-county area and taught managerial skills to the workers, encouraging them to come to the college to start their education. He was also a new student advisor, where he encouraged prospective students to think about attaining an associate degree. He often told them about how he started his education at community colleges.

He continued advising for almost ten years after retirement. He was hoping to pay it forward, thinking of all the financial help he received, by starting a scholarship in his name. Getting the ball rolling was the last item on his "to-do" list before he died.

EDISON STATE ESTABLISHES NEW POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Edison State Community
College Department of Public Safety
has changed dramatically over the past
18-months. After a very successful
history creating a safe campus
environment, and based on changing
campus safety and security standards,
the Department of Administration and
Finance determined the need for an
armed presence on campus. Safety
had been maintained through some
very well-designed physical security
measures and competent security
guards contracted to serve the
college.

In mid-2019, a search was conducted for a Director of Campus Safety and Security. Bruce Jamison, retired Chief of Police from the City of Piqua Police Department, was brought on board and found support from administration and trustees to form a police department to meet the needs of the college through professional law enforcement. A police department was established by meeting the requirements of the Ohio Attorney General's Office—the first new police department in the state in about five years.

In early 2020, Chief Jamison swore in the first two police officers of the Edison State Police Division. Both of which are well known on campus, have been students, and served as security officers for a number of years—Adam DeBrosse and Ragan Williams. Officer DeBrosse, a Piqua resident, had served as a Security Guard through a private company until he completed the Edison State Police Officer Academy, when he was hired by the college as its first armed security officer. Officer Williams, of Lima, had attended Edison State as a student-athlete on the Volleyball team. She completed the Edison State Police Officer Academy in December of 2019.

At about this same time, a vacancy occurred for the contracted security guard that worked evenings at the Greenville Campus. Campus Security Officer Joe Speer, a retired police lieutenant from Piqua Police Department, who lived and worked in

Covington, accepted the part-time job as an Edison State employee. He also began assisting in the establishment of professional standards for the department and the development of a policy manual for the newly formed police department.

As campus vulnerabilities were assessed by the new staff, the need for improvements to emergency operation plans was identified. Jim Bowell, a Troy resident who had retired from the Troy Fire Department and was working parttime for the Miami County Emergency Management Agency, agreed to join the department as a Reserve Officer in the position of Emergency Management Specialist.

"We continued to work to establish the most professional police department possible when it hit—the COVID-19 pandemic. Campus Safety and Security staff were in the building as we worked on emergency plans with every part of the college to find ways for our students to complete their educational goals in the midst of a global crisis," said Jamison.

Jim Bowell was then hired as a parttime Operations Center Manager. As the Department implemented safety measures that included screening every person that came into campus buildings, we also knew that the permanent safety improvements would require additional staff, both at the Piqua and Regional Campuses.

Staff expansion of the Department of Public Safety began in earnest to meet these new needs and prepare for the future with the support of Edison State's President and her cabinet. A strategic plan was developed that would provide armed police protection at all times classes are in session at the main campus, with police support at all regionals, and security at all facilities when the buildings are in use.

Campus Security Officer Al Decker was the next on board. He screens and greets the Piqua Campus employees on their arrival Monday through Thursday. He is retired from developmental disabilities services as an investigator and a manager after a long career in social work. He assists with crisis intervention needs and has already applied his extensive interviewing skills to assist during background investigations of new employees.

In the past few months, Edison State has searched for, interviewed, and conducted extensive background investigations to hire five more parttime Campus Security Officers and one more full-time Campus Police Officer. While it is too early to announce the Campus Police Officer due to COVID-related delays in polygraph examinations, the college is proud to introduce the five new Campus Security Officers.

We know we have responded well to the safety concerns presented by the pandemic, and are committed to continue to proactively serve all members of the campus community as we work together with them to stay safe while enabling students to complete their educational goals and realize their dreams here at Edison State," added Jamison.
