

Registered Apprenticeship programs teach high-level skills for today's workplace. Ohio has Registered Apprenticeship programs in fields ApprenticeOhio as diverse as construction, energy, health care,

manufacturing, and utilities. Each program includes, at a minimum, 2,000 hours of structured on-the-job training and 144 hours per year of related classroom instruction.

On average, apprentices who complete their program earn \$60,000 per year upon graduation.
